NEW Garden Program at Voyageur

Through the spring and summer, Voyageur staff, Club youth, volunteers, and community partners worked together to create a beautiful new garden space at Voyageur Environmental Center. BGCTC youth spent time in the garden learning about food systems, farming, and how to support a healthy ecosystem through sustainable land management practices. They also enjoyed tasting the variety of organic fruits and vegetables they grew and gained additional knowledge about the use of Voyageur's new greenhouse, complete with a pond that models the ecology of Little Long Lake. Campers drew inspiration from the beauty of the garden, filling the walls of the Greenhouse and the lodge with their very own artistic depictions of pollinators and plants.

Additionally, BGCTC campers were surprised with a guest appearance from the owner and head beekeeper of Ames Farm, Brian Fredericksen, who partners with Voyageur Environmental Center to host honeybee hives on the camp property. Brian brought delicious varieties of single-source honey

and honeycomb for youth to taste, as well as actual honeybee hive frames for youth to gain hands-on experience in "reading" a frame to help them understand the overall progress of the hive.

Real life exposure to gardens and gardening teaches youth about different sources of fresh produce, demonstrates community stewardship, and introduces the importance of environmental sustainability. BGCTC's Health & Wellness programming supports young people in building the healthy life skills they need to navigate important life decisions and cultivate a healthy lifestyle now and or their future.

It's an "Amazing Race" for Olson Middle School

Olson Middle School Club members celebrated the last day of summer programming with a fun and interactive Field Day. Club youth teamed up to compete in a game of "Amazing Race," utilizing different skill sets they had worked on over the summer to complete a variety of challenging tasks and activities. There were games of kickball, sailing toy ships, water balloon tosses, and relay races. Each team got to choose which teammate would complete in each activity and worked together to make sure everyone got a chance to participate. Then, once an activity was completed, each team earned a letter that would eventually spell out the word "SUMMER".

BGCTC's Health & Wellness strategy develops young people's capacity to live healthfully by educating youth about fitness, nutrition, smart decision making, and trauma-informed care practices. Club Field Days directly support this by keeping youth active while working collectively as a team to create plans, problem solve, and complete goals as a collective peer group.



Fun with STEM for Minneapolis Clubs

In June, Minneapolis Club youth from Little Earth, Southside Village, and Jerry Gamble Club Sites spent a day focused on the deeper learnings of STEM concepts through specific STEM projects. With the help of volunteers from National Grid Renewables, BGCTC Club members built interactive robots and working flashlights utilizing everyday materials such as plastic drink containers, aluminum foil, pipe cleaners, pencils and glue. Throughout the rest of the summer, youth worked with STEM mentors from the Sea Research Foundation to build boats, construct towers, and play math games with a focus on conservation.

STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) education is a core BGCTC program component that offers several benefits to youth, including teaching them creativity, critical problem-solving, life skills, ingenuity, resourcefulness, patience, and curiosity. Special Club happenings like STEM Day and mentorships engage our youth in a unique and creative way that fosters excitement for STEM disciplines and prepares youth for post-secondary STEM education and careers.

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Career Exploration with Corporate Partners

Teens from BGCTC's Mt. Airy and East Side Clubs visited the Carmeuse plant in Savage, MN on August 3 to learn about their company operations and manufacturing processes. Carmeuse is a global manufacturer of lime and limestone products used in a variety of applications, which provide cleaner air, safer water, and improved soil characteristics. Teens also learned about Carmeuse's culture, career and job opportunities, and got the unique opportunity to sit in the driver's seat of a Carmeuse heavy equipment simulator - which was a lot of fun!

BGCTC teens also had the opportunity this summer to visit the Minneapolis FBI Headquarters, gaining knowledge about the day-to-day operations of FBI, ERT, and SWAT divisions, and the Minnesota Twins and Old Navy where they spent time learning about how to bring their personal passions to their future careers.

Through career days with our Corporate Partners, teens gain self-confidence and self-efficacy to transition into post-secondary education in pursuit of their career aspirations. They also have the opportunity to make professional connections through networking that create pathways to a successful future beyond high school graduation.

Hands-on. multisensory math stations like these are centered on Minnesota Academic Standards in Mathematics and help youth build math proficiency. - Your gift will be put to use today, allowing you to see the difference your donation is making.
- Beginning in the year you turn 73, you can use your gift to satisfy all or part of your required minimum distribution (RMD).
- You pay no income taxes on the gift. The transfer generates neither taxable income nor a tax deduction, so you benefit even if you do not itemize your deductions.
- Since the gift doesn't count as income, it can reduce your annual income level. This may help lower your Medicare premiums and decrease the amount of Social Security that is subject to tax.
